

Beat Holiday Stress

The impact of Christmas can be profound and not always positive. Stress is intensified over family conflicts, the misuse of alcohol, heightened loneliness, financial worries, and domestic violence. Here are a few important facts to remember:

Build in time to spend with God by reading and studying the Word of God and praying over everything!

- Learn to journal and write down your thoughts and then find scriptures that overturn those negative thoughts into positive promises from God's Word.
- Learn to say "No". Saying "no" sometimes does wonders to holiday stress, clearing our minds to focus on what matters most. As you are confronted with invitations and commitments, ask God for wisdom about how to invest your time and energy.
- Change your perspective and decide that you will learn ways to experience God in the midst of a less-than -perfect gathering.
- Choose to be the family member that chooses to extend extra grace as a gift to others. Honesty and clear communication can help prevent major disagreement or conflict. Remember that "peace on earth" begins at home. We cannot control what others do, but we have the ability to turn away conflict. James 1:19 tells us to be "quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry."
- Grieving a Lost Loved One, loneliness. For many families this Christmas, there will be an empty chair at the table—a parent, spouse or loved one who has recently passed away. Holidays have a way of triggering memories and making grief fresh. It's important not to suppress grief. Be open with your family members, a trusted friend, or a counselor, as you talk about the good memories you had. A good way to honor that person you loved is to find a non-profit organization that supports what they were interested in and make a donation or volunteer some time for them. Remember that "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted" (Ps. 34:8) and "Heals the brokenhearted" in His time (Psalm 147:3).
- Financial Concerns. Lack of money and the pressures of gift-giving are two top holiday stressors. It's important to set a budget and learn to work within that budget. Simplify your gift giving. Try re-gifting or making something special from items you have at home. Write a song, play an instrument, sing a song for family gatherings as a gift to them. Only purchase what you can pay for in cash. Focus on spending time together, building good memories with family and friends, and give the gift of peace and love rather than giving purchased gifts.

Remember above all, Jesus is the reason for the season! Merry Christmas!




